Strengths:

High Attendance rate and relatively stable enrollment of students in grades 6, 7, and 8 were noted. Discipline referrals and failing grades have decreased due to the implementation of a multi-tiered system of supports. Literacy and numeracy curriculum related to MO Learning Standards is being updated.

Weaknesses:

Lack of consistency in implementation and a systemic and generally accepted method of screening students for additional reading and math interventions.

No building-wide accepted practices regarding literacy or math instruction and research-based teaching methods adhered to by all faculty.

Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:

Systemic method of screening and general acceptance / knowledge by teachers for use of the screening method.

Monitor the literacy and math curriculum related to the MO Learning Standards to better engage students, measure results (formative assessments), and provide targeted instruction in both literacy and math based on data.

Strengths:

Student attendance is strong

Students generally score average or slightly above on state assessments in regards to literacy but have been stagment over the past couple of years. Math scores on state assessments are generally average or below average.

Began implementing a multi-tiered system of supports which has decreased the number of students with failing grades

Weaknesses:

Special education services are heavily relied upon because their continue to be weakness in intervention strategies and differentiated instruction.

Students who received Title I services at the elementary school level are failing classes at a higher rate than peers who did not receive these services.

Literacy and math curriculum are being updated to more closely align with the MO Learning Standards.

Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:

Teaching methodologies that are research-based will need to be supported through on-going professional development.

The district needs to add Tier 2 math support at the middle school level.

All teachers are highly qualified in their fields.

Teachers are generally receptive to high quality professional development opportunties

Teaching culture operates from a growth midset

Weaknesses:

There is little building-wide vertical alignment of MO Learning Standards. Teacher are not implementing interventions with fidelity. Teacher are not consistent across grades 6-8 with educational programming.

There is a lack of materials to support current, reasearch-based strategies and teaching methodologies for students.

Teachers have not been adequately trained to provide virtual instruction.

Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:

Student materials and educational programs to support literacy and math curriculum and instruction.

Teacher learning materials to support professional development .

On-going teacher support from the DCI consultants and Title teachers
